



Seeds for the Gourney

Jesus, an epitome of Humility: Hosanna to the Son of David!

Dear friends, today we commemorate two very significant events in the life of Christ: his triumphal entry into Jerusalem and his passion during which we observe the tragic arrest, trial, sentence and execution of Jesus. Hence, today has two names: Palm Sunday and Passion Sunday. Today equally marks the beginning of Holy Week, the most solemn and most consequential week not only in our liturgical calendar, but for humanity. The events of this week changed the course of history for us humans, created in the *imago Dei*. That which was tainted and corrupted by sin, is made whole again. The Paschal mysteries which we commemorate this week reverse the course of disobedience initiated by Adam. Christ sums up all things in himself and restores humanity to its original state of holiness.

According to the Roman Missal on Palm Sunday during the Liturgy, "the Church recalls the entrance of Christ the Lord into Jerusalem to accomplish his Paschal Mystery. Accordingly, the memorial of this entrance of the Lord takes place at all Masses, by means of the Procession or the Solemn Entrance before the principal Mass or the Simple Entrance before other Masses." Today's solemn procession is an ancient custom in the Church in which we the faithful, in song and gesture, imitate the Jews who went to meet the Lord singing 'Hosanna.' As Pope Benedict XVI explains in his book, *Jesus of Nazareth*, vol.2, "while Jesus is making a royal claim, he wants his action to be understood in terms of Old Testament prophecies that are fulfilled in his person." The prophet Isaiah in today's First Reading describes how the suffering servant, the messiah, accepts the role of suffering which the Father had designated for him. That is why Jesus went up to Jerusalem voluntarily, knowing well that there he would die a violent death. He is excluding any Jewish earthly understanding of the messiah. He is neither building on violence nor instigating a military revolt. Rather, as Pope Benedict XVI beautifully puts it, "His power is of another kind: it is in God's poverty, God's peace, that he identifies the only power that can redeem" (Cf. *Jesus of Nazareth*, vol. 2]. Jesus is the suffering messiah; he is betrayed!

Our Lord is betrayed by one of his friends, Judas; the others deserted him; Peter, his lead apostle, denied him three times. The messiah suffers rejection, malice and hate. His messiahship is not that of one who wields earthly power, but one of humble service. This is described beautifully in the Second reading from St. Paul's letter to the Philippians,: "Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself taking the form of a slave... He was humble even to accepting death, death on a cross." Christ, the messiah, offered himself on the cross for our salvation. It is a lesson of humility.

One of the aspects the today's liturgy invites us to, is to meditate on God's unconditional love for us. Love is the key word that runs throughout this week. Palm Sunday is the definitive step God took to demonstrate God's love for us. It is because of God's love for us sinners that Jesus definitively entered Jerusalem. We are to strive each day to spread ourselves under Christ's feet and cultivate that unconditional love for Christ and his Church by following the gentle, lowly, humble and self-giving example of Christ who offered himself for our salvation. We are therefore challenged to embrace humility and love, ready to make sacrifices for others. Today, let us Hosanna to the Son of David!

Jubilee 2025 Pilgrims of Hope

Over the Jubilee Year we will explore the themes of Hope, Pilgrimage, and Jubilee, always ending with a question for you to consider over the week.

Today starts with a pilgrimage into Jerusalem. We see the disciples preparing for Jesus' entry, and then the crowd's reaction to his procession into the city. Pilgrimage is all about preparation and journey.

Pilgrimage to St. Michaels



On Saturday March 29, the Confirmation candidates and two of the grade 7 School of Religion students went on a pilgrimage to St Michael's Church. A pilgrimage is a spiritual journey to a holy site or outdoor space to experience God in a unique way. The goal is transformation. The pilgrims seek to encounter something deeper and profound from a less familiar but enriching environment. It is an intentional encounter with the story of God's work in the world. In 2010 at the Cathedral in Santiago de Compostela, Pope Benedict XVI said the following "To go on pilgrimage really means to step out of ourselves in order to encounter God where he has revealed himself, where his grace has shone with particular splendor and produced rich fruits of conversion and holiness among those who believe." Our Confirmation candidates sought to encounter God in service to the poor at Rochester hope and carried reflections at the very beautiful St Michael's Church. The day concluded with a recitation of the Jubilee Prayer of Hope. This pilgrimage was done in the context of the 2025 Jubilee of hope.
