

## **Solemn Mass of Chrism**

On Tuesday of Holy week **ALL** were invited, to attend the Chrism Mass at the Sacred Heart Cathedral. This includes the ordained religious groups or individuals, parishioners designated to transport the holy oil back to their parish, and those who are preparing for Sacraments.

During the Chrism Mass Bishop Matano concelebrates with priests from various regions of the diocese. Fr. Paul and his fellow priests renewed their promises made at their ordinations. Bishop Matano consecrated the Sacred Chrism and blessed the other oils to be used throughout the year.

<u>Oil of the Sick</u>: (Blessed) This oil is used for the Anointing of the Sick. Healing them in body, in soul, and in spirit, delivering them from every affliction.

Oil of Catechumens: (Blessed) This oil gives wisdom and strength to all who are anointed with it in preparation for their Baptism, bringing them to a deeper understanding of the Gospel.

<u>Oil of Chrism:</u> (Consecrated) This oil is to anoint for God; priests and kings, prophets and martyrs. It will be used at Baptisms, Confirmations, Ordinations to Sacred Priesthood and the Episcopacy. Added to this oil is Balsam. This sweet, fragrant resin from trees typifies the innate sweetness of the Christian virtues.

During Holy Thursday Mass they were individually presented by a representative (Oil Bearer) for each oil to Fr. Paul.

Then Deacon Mark and the Oil Bearers travelled to the Ambry with the oils to be placed in their respective spots. Each oil jar has an etched symbol that matches the symbol on the gold plaque on each shelf.

The type of oil used is Olive oil.

I enjoyed this wonderful mass. I invite you to consider attending next year.

#### St. Paul's Question of the Week

Dear editor, what is the season of Easter, what do we celebrate during this season and what major feasts do we celebrate during the Easter season?

Dear reader, as your question rightly implies, the Easter celebration does not end on Easter Sunday. During the Easter Season, Christians celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord. Jesus Christ, the Second Person of the Trinity, who became a human like us in all things but sin, was crucified, died and rose from the dead. By his rising from the dead, Christ conquers death and restores new life. When talking about the nature of the resurrection, Fr. Maurice Agbaw-Ebai (he is a professor of theology and philosophy at St John's Seminary, Boston) invites us to "understand the Resurrection not as a noun but as a verb. God has done something in Jesus of Nazareth that has implications for the world. By raising Jesus from the dead, God has shown that God is interested in doing something about evil, pain, injustice, and sin in the world...with the Resurrection, God has shown that God is not a passive spectator...God did not wait for history to end. God acted in history regarding injustice and evil. And so must we. That is the challenge and invitation of living the life of the Resurrection today. And that is why the Resurrection is essentially a verb and not a noun."

Liturgically, the Season of Easter ends on Pentecost Sunday. During Pentecost, the Church commemorates the coming down of the Holy Spirit on the disciples 50 days after Easter. But before that, today, the second Sunday of Easter, we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday, which concludes the Octave of Easter (the Easter Eight days). This feast was instituted by Pope Saint John Paul II on May 5, 2000, five days after the canonization of the Polish nun, St Faustina. St Faustina's Diary records 14 occasions when Jesus requested that a Feast of Mercy (Divine Mercy Sunday) be observed. In his Regina Caeli message of April 10, 1994, Pope Saint John Paul II said: "what is mercy if not the boundless love of God, who confronted human sin, restrains the sentiment of severed justice and, allowing Himself to be moved by the wretchedness of His creatures, spurs Himself to the total gift of self, in the Son's cross? We have a greater need than ever for a regenerating experience of Mercy." On this Divine Mercy, we celebrate God's immense love for us, our God who is merciful. On the fortieth day of Easter, Christians celebrate the Ascension of our Lord; the belief that Jesus went up to heaven while the disciples were watching.


# Lewis, C.S. <u>Surprised by Joy</u> (The Shape of my Early Life)

C.S. Lewis is the renowned British writer, scholar, and lay theologian who is probably best-known for his <u>The Chronicles of Narnia</u> series. Here he describes his spiritual journey and his eventual conversion from atheism to Christianity. He describes his early years, especially at Malvern College when he was 15, but the principal theme is *Joy*. This joy was a deep longing for something so good he couldn't put it into words. He began to read even more widely and often found himself profoundly moved by many writers who were Christian. He gradually realized the connection between *God* and *joy*. Joy was valuable because it pointed to God. (Call No. 92-LEW)
