

As I mentioned in my July Seeds article, we recently established a CRS Chapter in the Diocese of Rochester, the function of which is to educate parishioners on CRS' activities/programs and to advocate for the needs of the poor around the world. To that end, CRS chapter members around the country will be meeting with government officials to advocate for the reauthorization of the 2023 Farm Bill, a Bill that provides funding and oversight for food and agricultural programs both in the U.S. and across the world. This Bill is of particular importance to CRS because it provides funding for a large number of their overseas programs. However, the Farm Bill not only benefits the poor in other countries, it also strengthens the U.S. economy since U.S. farmers are paid by the government to grow the crops that are sent overseas. This provides income for farmers as well as jobs and income for those involved in logistics, trucking, shipping and everything else required to move commodities to their overseas destination. Moreover, the Bill helps support national security by providing better stability in countries around the world, eliminating the need for people to migrate.

During the first part of August, Rochester CRS Chapter members will be meeting with local and D.C. staff members of Senators Gillibrand and Schumer, as well as Congressman Morelle to provide education on the work of CRS and to encourage their support for the Bills' reauthorization. Of particular importance to CRS are the Bills' Title III programs that focus on overseas emergency food aid and agricultural development, as seen below.

2023 Farm Bill Title III Programs

Food for Peace

- Established in 1954 the oldest U.S. governmental food assistance program
- * Used for short term emergency food assistance, e.g., conflict/natural disasters
- * Long term development activities to build resilience, food security, address chronic problems, and reduce the need for future emergency assistance.

McGovern-Dole Food for Education

- * Works with existing school meal programs and food insecure communities to increase child literacy rates, improve nutritional outcomes (youth), and enhance dietary practices
- * Provides continuous and long term sustainability and education.
 - Local and regional procurement of commodities/jobs to all existing projects
 - Allows schools to source food locally and support local farmers
 - Allows transitioning to a sustainable home-grown school model

Bill Emerson Humanitarian Trust

- * A rainy day fund for unanticipated food crises when other resources are no longer available
- * The trust consists of cash reserves for the purchase of U.S. commodities to meet humanitarian needs.

The Farmer to Farmer Program

- * It assists low to moderate income communities with modernizing their agricultural sectors.
- * It donates U.S. commodities selling them on local markets.
- * Funds economic, agricultural development projects.
 - •E.G. Climate smart development
 - •Improving access to nutritious foods

Food for Progress

- * Trains farmers in animal and plant health
- Develops roads and utility systems
- * Establishes co-ops for farmers
- * Provides micro-finance loans
- Develops agricultural systems

While these programs comprise < 1% of the U.S. federal budget, they provide lifesaving emergency and long term sustainability assistance to millions of people and are crucial to the efforts of CRS around the world. I will keep you apprised of our advocacy efforts and will invite you to join us later in the year.



Christ Present in Church at Prayer

While Christ is truly present at Mass in the Word proclaimed, the Eucharistic bread and wine, and in the ministry of the priest, the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy of Vatican II affirmed that Christ is present "when the Church prays and sings, for he promised: 'Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them." Mass is not a "spectator sport", in which the priest performs and the people merely watch. The celebration of the Mass - Word and Eucharist - requires the participation of all the faithful because we are "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people." Through texts in the language of the people, music accessible to the assembly, and a fuller understanding of what we do, we are all called to engage fully each and every Sunday in this most holy liturgy.


