





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# Seeds for the Journey

I know it's hard to believe but it's that time of the year again. The leaves are almost completely down, Thanksgiving is behind us, and many homes in our neighborhoods are covered with lights. At the same time, as you entered the Church this weekend you found the Advent wreath resting peacefully in the Sanctuary and our vestments and decorations saturated with the color purple. The season of Advent is once again upon us.

Advent, you may recall, is both a season of preparation for the feast of the Nativity (Christmas) when we celebrate the first coming of Christ into the world, and a season of reflection that points us to the final judgment and the second coming of Christ. Our readings over the past month have reminded us of this future event while warning us to be watchful and prepared. A few weeks ago, we heard about the bridegroom who arrives unexpectedly, only to find that not all his servants are prepared. We then heard the story of the master who returned from a long journey with the expectation that his servants invested his money wisely; not all did. In Today's Gospel, we hear Jesus warning us to be watchful and alert, since we don't know when the Lord will return! Four times we heard Jesus tells us – watch!

It sounds ominous, doesn't it? But the season of Advent helps us to see that we are not to hide in the shadows of the second coming of Christ, as if it were something to fear. Ours is to live in the light of Jesus' return with a spirit of joyful hope, as if it is something wonderful and glorious. And there is no greater witness and example of waiting in joyful hope than Mary, the mother of Jesus. Mary's response to the angel Gabrielle's invitation for her to give birth to the Son of God was simple and profound: "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me accord-ing to your word." In essence, Mary said to the angel and to herself, "I don't know for sure what this whole experience of birthing the messiah is about, but I will trust and hope that good things will happen." Having little control over the situation, once she said yes, Mary is willing to wait in hope for the possibilities the future will hold, possibilities beyond her imagination.

Like Mary, we too prepare for and wait on events that stretch our imaginations. During advent we wait, ironically, for an event that has already taken place, the Incarnation, the coming of God into the world. And, by recalling what God has already done in the first advent, we can look forward with joyful hope to what God will do in the second advent, when Christ will come again in glory!

Our hope, however, is not only future oriented. Our hopeful waiting for the coming of Christ is a way of life that enables us to stay faithful in the difficult times of the present. The whole of our Advent journey tells us that even as we struggle with life's issues today, and we all have plenty of those, we have reason to hope. Even when we don't understand the events in the world around us, we have reason to hope. Even as we deal with stress, confusion, or grief this holiday season, we have reason to stay hopeful. Even as we grapple with our own faith, we have reason to hope. And the reason for our hope is that God, who in his great love for us shared in our humanity, continues to be with us today in Word and Sacrament, enabling us to grow in faith and holiness and in love for one another.

I pray that God will grace our hearts this coming Advent and Christmas season, and beyond, with a deep abiding peace that that enables us to live out our faith in this life, as together we wait with joyful hope for the coming of our savior, Jesus the Christ.

#### Goodbye Katie

Advent was meant to be a time of peace, joy, love, and hope. A time to prepare and celebrate the coming of the Lord. Lately I've been lacking this peace. I'm sure many of you may feel the same way during the holidays. Shopping, celebrating, sending cards, traveling, making cookies; and it's only the start of the advent season. This uneasiness is kind of how I've felt in my personal life; like we're continuously preparing for Christmas, but the peace of Christ has not arrived. My family has been experiencing many changes, especially after the death of my brother-in-law. It's my eldest daughter, Avery's, senior year. We've gone on several college visits, she's completed her college applications, finished her last school swim season, and is working. My middle child, Annika, is a junior, going through the biggest year in high school. She's into acting, travel softball, beginning her college search, and working as well. My son Vaughn plays travel hockey, travel soccer, piano, percussion, and started middle school this year. In addition to my children's schedules, Leo, my husband, received a promotion which requires him to travel several times a month. When I'm not working, I'm living in my car, driving everywhere from Buffalo to Poughkeepsie to Pittsburg, preparing notes for the diocesan school board as the Catholic Identity Chair and completing my homework for St. Bernard's in between hockey games, play intermissions and swim matches. Our lives can be anything but peaceful at times, and this restlessness has been felt by all members of my family, especially me.

In a conversation with Avery, I asked her about the stress in our lives. Her response was eye opening, "Mom if you are stressed, that is not from God. God isn't stress and he doesn't want that for you." She's right (and a total genius)! After months of prayerful discerning Avery's comment, while feeling as if God was completely silent in the process, I finally opened my heart enough to allow God to enter. Working here has been one of the greatest joys of my life, but I feel that my timing is just a little off. Thank you for allowing me into your lives. I am honored and humbled to have worked with you over the last 2 ½ years. What an immense blessing. I know the staff here will take great care of the Adult Faith Community. This ministry is vital to our parish. I wish you Christ's peace in your hearts, mind and soul. My family and I will still be around; therefore, I look forward to seeing you at mass and around the Webster area. I'll really be living by the words of Pope Francis, "Peace is a daily commitment. 

# Rohr, Richard <u>The Good News According to Luke</u> (Spiritual Reflections)

The Gospel of Luke is one of the four New Testament Gospels that recount the life and death of Jesus, whose birth we await during the Advent season. Luke's Gospel is sometimes called "the Gospel of the poor" or "the Gospel of mercy." Father Rohr asks what is God trying to do through these sacred Scriptures. The Bible is not a lecture or treatise on God; it is the story of the experience of God. It is the story of God revealing Himself to the people; it is not a text that always provides easy answers. When Luke started putting together his gospel story, almost fifty years had passed since the death and resurrection of Jesus so he relied on many sources to gather information. Father Rohr shares his understanding of Luke's message with today's reader, shedding light on its main themes. (Call No. 226.407)



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
