





Seeds for the Journey

We have started Lent recalling how the Holy Spirit drove Jesus into the desert where he remained for 40 days fasting and praying. He was tempted by the devil. And then he began his preaching with a call to conversion, telling the people, "The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel." And Pope Francis in his message for Lent 2024 said "Lent is a time of conversion, where the desert can become a place where our freedom can mature in a personal decision not to fall back into slavery" of sin.

As the Lenten season continue, we are reminded that through the Holy Spirit and the waters of baptism we are washed free from the slavery of sin and promised the eternal life in the kingdom of God. However, we remain sinners. And since Jesus and saints were tempted, we can't escape temptations. That is why we need repentance and the sacrament of reconciliation that we can receive any day by appointment, Saturdays at 2pm and the Diocesan-wide Day of Penance and Mercy on Thursday, February 22. The time for confessions here at St. Paul's will be: 9:00-11:00 am, 12 noon-4:00pm and 6:00-8:00pm. We shall have the Eucharistic Exposition and Adoration the whole day 9:00 am-8:00pm.

The church has given us 40 days of Lent for repentance and spiritual renewal. 40 is a number harkening to the time of rain which caused the flood, the years Israel spent wandering in the desert, and the days Jesus faces the temptations in the desert. His victory was achieved through prayer, fasting, and obedience to the word of God. We too, journey into the spiritual desert through **fasting**, **prayer**, and **almsgiving** with humble hearts that recognize our sinfulness. We seek God's mercy and forgiveness.

Pope Francis in his message invites us to pause for prayer and to assist our brothers and sisters in need. We can do this by donating gifts towards CMA, contributing money towards our St. Paul's parish, participating in CRS Rice Bowl, Good Sam's Lenten Food Drive to help Sister Regis Food cupboard, Eastern Service Workers, St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, Webster Hope, Webster Backpack, and Williamson Come-Unity Center.

"Faith and Charity," Pope Francis said, "take hope, this small child, by the hand. They teach her to walk, and at the same time, she leads them forward." So, Lent is a time to change our own lives and to change the lives of others, especially the poor. We repent through prayers, sacrifice, and charity. The Holy Spirit was with Jesus in the desert during his battle to defeat the devil who tried to destruct him from his mission. And the Holy Spirit will be with us too in our struggles. And just as the angles helped and guided God's people wandering in the desert, the angles ministered on Jesus, and angles will help us too. The kingdom of God is at hand, but it is not yet fulfilled. Let us pray for its coming. "Repent and believe in the Gospel."



St. Paul's Question of the Week

Question to the editor: Dear editor why is Lent 40 days long?

The number 40 is mentioned 146 times in the Bible. It generally symbolizes a period of testing, trial or probation.

In the Old Testament, Moses lived 40 years in Egypt and 40 years in the desert before God selected him to lead His people out of slavery. Moses was also on Mount Sinai for 40 days and nights, on two separate occasions (Exodus 24:18, 34:1-28), receiving God's laws. He also sent spies, for 40 days, to investigate the land God promised the Israelites as an inheritance (Numbers 13:25, 14:34). The prophet Jonah powerfully warned ancient Nineveh, for 40 days, that its destruction would come because of its many sins (Jonah 3:4).

In the New Testament we find the number 40 is significant in the life of Jesus: Jesus fasted 40 days and nights (Matthew 4:2); Jesus was tempted 40 days by Satan (Luke 4:2, Mark 1:13); Jesus remained on earth 40 days after Resurrection (Acts 1:3).

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches that because of the above, "by the solemn 40 days of Lent, the Church unites herself each year to the mystery of Jesus in the desert" (n. 540).

Lozano, Neal <u>Unbound</u> (A Practical Guide to Deliverance)

Deliverance, in its broadest sense, means "salvation". Our awareness of the devil and the work of evil spirits in our lives is often minimal. The author believes that 98 percent of deliverance from evil is resisting temptation, repenting of sin, renouncing the devil, forgiving those who have harmed us, and learning the truth—of who God is, what He has said, and what He expects of us. This book is not so much about evil spirits as it is about acknowledging the doors we have left open to the influence of evil and learning how to close them. We need renewed resolve to welcome God's grace into our everyday lives, recognizing the gift of salvation that Christ's death on the cross has already achieved for us. (Call No. 235.4-LOZ)
