





Remembering Pope Benedict XVI: A Synopsis of His Life, Thoughts and Works Part 2



As we indicated in the first part of this series, Pope Benedict was a great scholar. He was a genuine intellectual par excellence even before he became Pope. He has greatly contributed to the development of doctrine and to the wealth of theological reflection we have. But importantly, through his writings, the now late Pope has brought us closer to Jesus, has given us deeper insights into understanding the person, life and ministry of Jesus, the

Son of God, the second person of the Trinity. We shall not pretend to cover all or talk about everything he wrote. However, we shall highlight a few teaching aspects that can give us a deeper insight into who Benedict was and that which can help grow our theological knowledge, and consequently help our faith in God.

As Pope, Benedict XVI wrote three encyclical letters. An encyclical is a letter written by the Pope to the Church as a whole or to a particular Church. It expresses the Pope's ordinary teaching authority. The three encyclicals include: *Deus Caritas Est* (God is Love), published on December 25, 2005; *Spe Salvi* (Saved by Hope), published on November 30, 2007; *Caritas in Veritate* (The Truth in Charity), published on June 29, 2009.

Less than one year into his Pontificate, Pope Benedict published his first encyclical letter, *Deus Caritas Est* (God is Love) on Christmas Day of 2005. How fitting! Writing his first encyclical on love was intentional. Pope Benedict writes "I wish in my first encyclical to speak of the love which God lavished upon us and which we in turn must share with others." This great work on love reflects on God as the author of love and our response to that love. It is God who always takes the initiative when we love. Our loving is seen in the way we treat one another in society. It is seen in the way we show love to one another in the community. The encyclical is divided into two parts and has 42 paragraph numbers.

The encyclical begins with a reflection on the forms of love as seen in Greek philosophy and their relationship to the teachings of Christ. For the Greeks, the word 'love' has different forms: eros (possessive, often sexual love), philia (friendship), and agape (unconditional, self-sacrificing love). According to Pope Benedict XVI, everything we do in the Church is an expression of love that seeks our integral good. Jesus Christ is the incarnate love of God. Thomas Aquinas defines love as effectively willing the good of another. This is exemplified by Jesus. In him, Love reaches its most radical form through his death on the Cross. This love has an enduring present in the Eucharist. The Eucharistic sacrifice perpetuates Christ's sacrifice on the cross. When we participate in the Eucharist, we too are involved in the dynamic of self-giving. We become united with Jesus and together with others in the community, we all become one body. In this way, love of neighbor and love of God are truly united. If we truly love God, then we must love our brothers and sisters in the community.

Curran, Charles E. Faithful Dissent

Father John Walsh, our late founding pastor, enjoyed many types of reading, including books on spirituality and theology. He appreciated the insights of Charles Curran, an eminent Catholic moral theologian. In this book, Father Curran gives both the historical record and his own interpretation of his dispute with the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith over the legitimacy of theological and practical dissent from noninfallible hierarchical teaching on a number of issues, including sexual ethics. The first part includes his commentary and theological analysis of all that was involved. The second part is documentary and includes all the correspondence between the Congregation and himself. On the basis of this documentation, readers will be able to make their own judgments about the controversy. (Call No. 262.8-CUR)
