# Seeds for the Journey

## Stock-taking and Resolutions for New Year!

Think if someone were to give you \$10 for every good action you did for someone and kind words you ever spoke about people and then take back \$5 for every time you were mean in actions and words towards people, would you be poor or rich this year? This is the time to stock-take and assess the extent to which our behavior and programs have achieved their goals and then make New Year's resolutions. Resolutions are a means to start afresh and hope that we can do better with the help of God's grace.

In US, recent statistics show that about 40% of Americans make New Year's resolutions. The success rate of putting these resolutions into practice is about 30%. So, we should be gentle and patient with ourselves and others. When making resolutions, some of us forget about making any that will help us Love God and neighbor. We often have good intentions to be healthy by losing weight through physical exercise, diet, and getting more sleep. These are all good, but they leave out an important piece of improving our relationships with Our Lord. We know as we grow closer to Christ, it becomes easier to share His love with others by words and actions.

"Most importantly, the practice of resolutions at the beginning of the year is rooted in a recognition that our recent past has not always been a stellar success. We desire to do better when the new year dawns. It is not difficult to see how well this perspective coincides with our Christian practice of repentance, penance, and forgiveness" (Page 10, The Priest Magazine November 2023 Vol.79, No.11). Hence when it comes to spiritual life, stocktaking, and resolution to do better is done through daily examination of conscience as recommended by saints such as St. Mother Teresa and St. Ignatius of Loyola. This method of Spiritual Exercises has 5 points:

- 1. Gratitude: Begin by giving thanks to God for all the favors we have received each day.
- 2. Awareness: Asking the Holy Spirit to enlighten us so that we can see with light of God's grace.
- 3. **Review:** See the moments we were doing good meaning God was present and when we were doing evil because of God's absence or our absence from him.
- 4. Forgiveness: Expressing our sorrow and asking God to forgive and heal us for the wrong we have done.
- 5. **Resolve:** Making resolutions to do better and praying for God's grace to help us be more available to Him and other people especially those in need of our help.

Being a better person who love God and neighbor should be our main New Year's resolution. This will give us peace and joy just like the magi were overjoyed when they saw the star of our Lord. Through the intercession of Blessed Virgin Mary, may God grant us a New Year filled with blessings and good health. While I will be away January 10-31 visiting my mom in Kenya, I will keep you in my prayers and hope you do the same.

# Dear editor, how many Liturgical seasons are there in the Church?

Dear reader, the Liturgical Year begins on the First Sunday of Advent and ends on the Solemnity of Christ the King. There are four seasons in the Church: Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter.

- During Advent, Christians await and prepare for the coming of the messiah: Jesus.
- During Christmas, Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Messiah. Christmas is also known as the Incarnation.
- Lent is a period of purification, a period of repentance during which Christians prepare for Easter through acts of fasting, abstinence, almsgiving and intense prayer. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends just before the Mass of the Last Supper on Holy Thursday.
- During Easter, Christians celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord. Jesus Christ, who rose from the Dead conquers death and restores new life.
- Easter ends on Pentecost. During Pentecost, the Church commemorates the coming down of the Holy Spirit on the Disciples, 50 days after Easter.
- On the fortieth day of Easter, Christians celebrate the Ascension; the belief that Jesus went up to heaven while the disciples were watching.
- Ordinary Time is the period between Christmas and Lent, and the period between Easter and Advent.





#### (Care of Your Neighbor as a Spiritual Practice)

Jesus spent much time in prayer, and then went forth in action. Spirituality involves more than the techniques of interior life and prayer; the social teachings of the church also give practical guidance about how Christians can live the gospel of Jesus. Inherent in this teaching is the belief in the value and dignity of every person which comes from God and is independent of any human accomplishment or quality. The book is centered on seven themes such as caring for God's creation, the rights of workers, and the needs of the poor and the vulnerable. Each chapter begins with a vignette about a person with a Rochester connection; at the conclusion of each chapter, there are questions to help the reader reflect on living the teachings of Jesus in a practical way.
