



Seeds for the Journey

"They prostrated themselves and did him homage." Today we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. The Epiphany is a feast of the manifestation or revelation of God. God has visited His people in the person of Jesus Christ. We celebrate God's immense love for us, so much so that God took on human flesh and became one like us in all things but sin. Today's feast reminds us clearly that Jesus is king, Jesus is Lord of the universe, and Jesus is God who unites all together.

In today's Gospel, we read the beautiful story of the visit of the Magi by Matthew, the Evangelist. Led by the star, the Magi went to see the child Jesus, the new king of the Jews. Even though the Bible does not mention their names, the Magi, the three wise men from the east, have been traditionally given the names Casper, Melchior and Balthazar. We do know that they were clever, wealthy and brave. They were also attentive to God's voice; that is why they did not return to Herod, who was greatly troubled hearing that a baby has been born who is the new king of the Jews. When they found the baby Jesus and his parents Mary and Joseph, the Magi prostrated themselves and paid homage to Jesus, offering him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

These gifts are highly symbolic. The gold symbolizes Christ's kingship. Christ is king not only of the Jews but of the entire universe. Christ is the king of all creation. Christ is also our king here at St Paul's. The frankincense, which is a sweet-smelling resin used in worship, represents Christ's priesthood. Jesus is the high priest par excellence. Jesus is the mediator between God and humans. We learnt in our School of Religion and Confirmation classes that through Baptism we share in Christ's priestly office – in fact, we are made priests, kings and prophets. St. Cyprian is known to have said that every Christian is another Christ (*Christianus alter Christus*). Through Baptism we are all called to holiness. By our reception of the Eucharist, we are called to be Christ to the world. The gift of myrrh foreshadows Christ's death. It is an ointment used in burial. Christ won Redemption for us by his death on the cross. Christ conquered sin. We too are called to die to sin (Romans 6:11). We should neither allow ourselves to be dominated by sin nor should we conform ourselves to the pattern of this world; rather we should be transformed by God's grace working in us and we should bring God to others in season and out of season. This transforming power of God in us should be seen by the way we live our lives in society.

Gold, frankincense and myrrh were Christ's own Christmas presents. Scholars tell us that even the Magi themselves may not have fully understood the impact of their Christmas presents. We should also make sacrifices for Jesus as did the Magi. What are we ready to offer up to Jesus during this new year 2023? Christ wants us to grow in holiness everyday and to live out the gospel values at our homes, our jobs or wherever we find ourselves. In our Confirmation program, we are continuing to stress the importance of being present at Sunday Mass, helping in any of the roles at Mass, being comfortable celebrating the sacrament of Penance, and last but not the least, bringing a positive difference at school by witnessing to the gospel values and spreading love.

By encountering God and celebrating Jesus's birth, we should strive to be God's worthy ambassadors in society through our words and actions. We can emulate the example of the Magi, who were courageous enough to make the difficult and uncertain trip to look for Jesus. Nothing could stop them from find Jesus and paying him homage. We too shouldn't allow anything to stop us from looking for and welcoming Jesus in our lives, for Jesus is with us always, yes even to the end of time.

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Remembering Pope Benedict XVI: A Synopsis of His Life, Thoughts and Works Part 1



Today, we begin a series on the life and work of Pope Benedict XVI whose funeral took place on Thursday January 5, 2023. In order to honor the life of this great Pope and Church scholar, we shall highlight certain aspects of his life and scholarly work both as a theologian and as the head of the Universal Church. Pope Benedict was born on April 16, 1927 in Bavaria, Germany and was giv-


en the name Joseph Aloisius Ratzinger. He was ordained a priest on June 29, 1951. As a priest, he held a long career as a theology professor at several German universities. Due to his reputation as a great intellectual and scholar, he was invited by the Archbishop of Munich to be his peritus at the Second Vatican Council that was held in three different sessions from 1962 to 1965. The then Fr. Ratzinger was appointed Archbishop of Munich and Freising by Pope Paul VI. He was ordained a bishop on May 28, 1977. Pope Paul VI created a Cardinal on June 27, 1977, barely one month after his episcopal ordination. Pope John Paul II appointed him the Prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith (CDF) in 1981, a position he held until he became Pope. As head of the CDF he was known for his unwavering orthodoxy and his staunch defense of Catholic doctrine, morals, values and the liturgy. In 2002, the then Cardinal Ratzinger became the Dean of the College of Cardinals. He was one of the closest confidants of Pope John Paul II and a very major figure in the Vatican. He became Pope on April 19, 2005, at the conclave that was held after the death of Pope John Paul II. Cardinal Ratzinger chose the name Benedict. It was Pope Benedict XVI who began the beatification process of Pope John Paul II. During his papacy, he canonized 45 people. Pope Benedict resigned as Pope in February 2013 citing his deteriorating strength and the physical and mental demands of the papacy.

Throughout his writings one of the key aspects Pope Benedict XVI was concerned with was the Enlightenment in general and the German strand in particular known as the *Aufklärung*. The *Aufklärung* was built on the foundation that the natural faculty of human reason is qualitatively similar to the divine reason although quantitatively weaker. It was more centered on the human person than on the Divine. As both a theologian and as the Pope, Benedict XVI was very concerned with the perspectives and positions of that mindset and that of the west as a whole. To him, the *Aufklärung* marked an enduring criticism of revealed faith, a critique that we as a Church must continue to engage with and respond to, for it touched on the fundamental relationship between faith and reason in today's world rooted in relativism; a world, especially the developed world, that is very hostile to the Christian faith in general and to Catholicism in particular. To Pope Benedict, what is urgent is to open up spaces of conversation and dialogue so that together the currents of secular rationality and faith could mutually enrich one another.
