

Seeds for the Journey

This weekend the Church takes up the annual Bishop's overseas funding appeal, otherwise known as The Catholic Relief Services Collection. Below is a summary of the work this collection supports, derived from the USCCB website:https://www.usccb.org/national-collection/catholic-relief-services-collection. Note that the collection supports five organizations in addition to Catholic Relief Services (CRS).

The Catholic Relief Services Collection supports Catholic Church organizations that carry out international relief and solidarity efforts. Programs include relief and resettlement for victims of persecution, war, and natural disasters; development projects to improve living conditions for the poor; legal and support services for poor immigrants; peace and reconciliation work for people suffering from violence; and advocacy on behalf of the powerless.

Here is an example of CRS programing supported by the collection. Sophie, a widow working in a village in Burkina Faso, was struggling to feed her family and pay for schooling for her children. Thanks to the help of Catholic Relief Services, one of the CRSC-supported organizations, her village was able to set up a Savings and Internal Lending Community (SILC). Through the SILC, members contribute what they can afford, allowing them to pool their resources and save collectively. Members can then borrow money to meet pressing needs or develop business opportunities. Through the SILC, Sophie was able to take out a \$200 loan to cover startup costs for her own canteen, a sum that would be nearly impossible for her to save. Her canteen has been very successful and began to pay off in only six months. Her community has benefited too, as she has been able to hire three assistants to work with her. Without the SILC and the work of CRS, it would have been nearly impossible for her, and others like her, to create a sustainable life for her and her family.

Persecution of Christians and other religious minorities by extremist groups such as ISIS in the Middle East has forced families to flee their homes with few possessions or resources. Through generous contributions to The Catholic Relief Services Collection, as well as the efforts of bishops to engage policy makers to protect these vulnerable families, we are providing badly-needed material and spiritual support to refugees here and abroad. A father, mother, and two sons from Iraq fled this persecution, and after living in a refugee camp in Indonesia while undergoing extensive security screening and interviews, they resettled in Massachusetts. Through support of the collection, volunteers welcomed the family, donated household items and furniture, and arranged reduced-rent housing during their transition. With ongoing support, refugees like this family find employment, learn English, and build new homes, far from the religious and political violence they faced overseas.

In keeping with the theme "Help Jesus in Disguise," the funds collected through The Catholic Relief Services Collection support vital Catholic programs that share in the Catholic mission of promoting the sacredness of human life and the dignity of the human person.

Contributions to The Catholic Relief Services Collection are distributed to these six organizations:

Catholic Relief Services for international relief and development.

Migration and Refugee Services for refugee resettlement.

Catholic Legal Immigration Network Inc. (CLINIC) for immigration legal services.

Department of Justice, Peace, and Human Development for advocacy.

Holy Father's Relief Fund for emergency relief.

Secretariat of Cultural Diversity in the Church for evangelization and ministry.

By supporting The Catholic Relief Services Collection, you help these organizations build richer lives for faithful around the world. The Catholic Relief Services Collection is promoted by staff of the Committee on National Collections. Collection funds are administered by the USCCB Administrative Committee.

I hope this summary helps your understanding of the kind of programing this collection supports. Thank you for all that you do to assist our brothers and sisters around the world who are not a well off as we are.



Question of the Week

Dear editor am I required to abstain from food before receiving Holy Communion?

Dear reader, thank you for your question. What you are asking about is called the "Eucharistic Fast." According to Church Law, "a person who is to receive the Most Holy Eucharist is to abstain for at least one hour before Holy Communion from any food and drink, except for only water and medicine." In the past, that is before 1983, one was expected to fast from midnight. It involved a complete abstinence from all food and drink, including water and medicine from midnight. However, there were some exceptions, for example, a person who had been confined to bed for a month without sight of an early recovery could, if their confessor agreed, receive Holy Communion even if they has previously taken medicine or drink.

The Eucharistic fast now involves fasting from food or drink for at least once hour before receiving Holy Communion. Water and medicine do not break the fast. The qualification 'at least' means that one hour is the minimum; a person may reasonable fast for longer if they wished. One should not be scrupulous about the length of the one hour either.

Some Christians ask if the hour's fast begins one hour before Mass or one hour before they take Holy Communion. My opinion is that the one hour begins one hour before Mass starts; however, you should not be too scrupulous about this. If Mass was particularly long, then a person could continue eating up to the time of Mass and fast during the Mass.

From the John Walsh Library

Rohr, Richard Job and the Mystery of Suffering

Job called it "the voice from the whirlwind;" Christians call it "the cross." It is the same pattern discovered by Anne Frank, Mohandas Gandhi, and Nelson Mandela. It is the question of why there is suffering in the world, even for those who lead a good and upright life. Richard Rohr explores the Book of Job, both in its historical setting and as an important message for today. If no meaning can be given to human suffering, if our wounds are not capable of becoming sacred wounds, humanity is surely doomed to a blaming war, with everyone against everyone else. Without the presence of Job and Jesus, our only question is "Who is to blame for my pain and my unhappiness?" But the restored Job and the risen Christ give witness to the reality of pain but also to a new sense of joy and freedom when we place faith and trust radically in God alone. (Call No. 223.106-ROH)




