

Geeds for the Journey

Today the universal Church commemorates the second Sunday of Lent. Lent is a season of Grace, a penitential season, during which we are called to pray, fast and give alms. During his homily on Ash Wednesday, Fr Paul outlined some ways through which we can participate in alms giving during Lent. During the season of Lent, Catholics are called upon to practice penance. Penance is integral to the Christian life because we have been redeemed by Christ's passion, death and resurrection. Penance is not an 'optional extra' that some may choose to do from time to time: the law of God obliges all people to do penance. The Church, following the lead of Pope Paul VI, sees fasting and abstinence as part of the larger concept of penance. For Pope Paul VI, fasting and abstinence have a privileged place among the forms of penance. As Bishop Matano indicated in his Lenten Guidelines of Fasting and Abstinence letter, "these Lenten practices unite us to our savior, Jesus Christ, who through His sacrificial death upon the cross wrought our salvation." During this season of Lent, we are all called to make personal acts of penance and to devote ourselves in special ways to prayer, works of piety and charity and to self-denial. We should spend more time reading the scriptures, attend stations of the Cross and also go to Confession. We are invited to join our Confirmation candidates for Stations of the Cross on Thursday March 30 at 6:30pm. We are all called to repentance.

During this season of Lent, the Gospel accounts all have a very special focus. Last Sunday, the First Sunday of Lent, the Gospel Reading was focused on the Temptations of Jesus by the devil. Next Sunday, the Third Sunday of Lent, the Gospel recounts Jesus' encounter with the Woman of Samaria at the well. During the Fourth Sunday of Lent, which is Laetare Sunday (Rejoice Sunday), Gospel recounts Jesus' encounter with the man who was born blind. The Gospel reading for the Fifth Sunday of Lent is on the Raising of Lazarus. Today's Gospel Reading from Matthew's Gospel account is on the Transfiguration.

Jesus went up a high mountain with Peter, James and his brother John where he was transfigured. He was seen conversing with Moses symbolizing the law, and Elijah, symbolizing the prophets. Christ is the Word of God in the Law and in the Prophets. He is the fulfilment of the Law and the Prophets. Pope Francis in his 2023 Lenten message calls on us to listen to Jesus. According to Pope Francis, "Lent is a time of grace to the extent that we listen to him as he speaks to us." There is no better way that Christ speaks to us than through the readings during Mass. According to St Augustine, Jesus himself shone as the sun, signifying that he is the true light that enlightens all of us. As Christians, we should radiate this light of Christ wherever we find ourselves especially during this season of Lent. We can bring this light of Christ to others by praying for them, by giving alms, by voluntary self-denial, and by helping to bring back to St Paul's parishioners, family members and friends who no longer attend Mass here. We can make an impact on the lives of others. We can make our parish better and stronger.

Remembering Pope Benedict XVI: A Synopsis of His Life, Thoughts and Works Part 7

In the last series, we introduced Pope Benedict's special interest on the Liturgy. We stated that Pope Benedict or Ratzinger the theologian, made the Liturgy a top-notch priority, which he considered, a crucial element in the love of God. The Liturgy is the highest form of worship in the Church; it surpasses all forms of worship for it is an action of Jesus Christ himself, the high priest. Liturgical celebrations supersede all forms of private and personal devotions.

In his writings on the Liturgy, Pope Benedict sought to restore to its rightful pride of place, the concept of the Holy Mass as an action of Christ Himself acting in and through the priest to bring the Paschal Mystery to our midst once again. The Paschal Mystery refers to the events of the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus. The Eucharistic Liturgy (the Holy Mass) is a representation of Christ's Calvary Sacrifice. The Mass is therefore a memorial; it is not just a remembrance, but we are re-living what happened on Calvary, where Christ voluntarily offered himself. During Mass, the priest celebrant acts in persona Christi capitis (in the person of Christ the Head). Christ is acting through the priest, who has been chosen from among us to offer sacrifices to God on behalf of the community. Pope Benedict sought to restore the centrality of the Eucharistic Liturgy in the lives of the faithful, for as the Second Vatican II taught, the Liturgy is the source and summit of our Christian life and mission.

Pope Benedict believed that the love of God in the liturgy needed to be a priority and the love we express and receive would then flow into our ordinary lives. As a result. we too shall share this love with others in our various families, in the community, at our jobs, at school, at sporting events and with whoever we meet. Whatever we do in the Liturgy should be focused on God. God should always be at the center and should be our focus and not us. Pope Benedict was weary of the dangers of self-worship infiltrating liturgical celebrations. He warned against the Liturgy becoming "a feast that the community gives itself, a festival of self-affirmation. Instead of being a worship of God, it becomes a circle closed in on itself." These are some of the dangers the faithful need to avoid falling into. We need a God-centered liturgy, one where we encounter God in Spirit and in Truth. The Liturgy is transforming and we can only benefit fully from the fruits of the Liturgy when we celebrate with genuine piety, devotion and with an openness to encounter the Triune God with fidelity and with love.

This ends our series on the life and works of Pope Benedict. Of course, we have not examined a tenth of his thoughts

and works; however, what we have covered have given us a glimpse and an idea of Pope Benedict's theological enterprise.

He was a great theologian, teacher and Pope. His teachings and his works are being studied by Catholic and non-Catholic theologians, by seminarians, Christians who want to deepen their faith in God, and others out of intellectual curiosity. His teachings and works will be beneficial for generations to come.


