Seeds for the Journey

For the past 18 months the people of Ukraine have suffered greatly due to the ravages of war brought on by the invasion of Russian forces. Over 7 million people have fled to neighboring countries, while 6.3 million remain displaced within Ukraine. Meanwhile, the constant bombardment of cities, towns, and villages by Russian missiles continues to create an atmosphere of stress, anxiety, and sleepless nights for thousands. But even as peace appears to be far off, the people of Ukraine have demonstrated an amazing resilience. As the war continues in the south and eastern regions of the country, communities in other parts have opened up their homes to fellow countrymen seeking help. As CRS reports in a recent Global update, *"families are finding ways to stay together, seeking normalcy amid chaos. They are finding ways—even if remotely, from a shelter—to safely enroll their children in school, establish a semblance of home and manage their lives as best they can."*

As Ukrainians strive to help one another, CRS and its partners continue to help meet essential needs, including, food, shelter, medical services, and living supplies, in addition to counseling services, and repair of war-damaged homes. Over 6 million people within Ukraine and neighboring countries have been assisted.

As the war in Ukraine continues, along with the political debate about American support, I want to draw your attention to a book I recently read entitled "Ukraine Diary", by renowned spiritual writer Fr. Henri Nouwen. Published just this year, the book is an account of Nouwen's encounter with the Ukrainian people on two visits he made to Ukraine in 1993 and 1994, a few years before his unexpected death. The book sheds light on the struggles, the hopes, and the dreams of the Ukrainian people in the years immediately following their freedom from Soviet domination.

In the book, Nouwen writes an account of his daily activities as he preaches, offers retreats and workshops, and interacts with several communities of disabled persons. But within his daily reflections, Nouwen makes references to the history of the Ukrainian people, their centuries long struggles against domination and oppression, and their desire for global recognition as a free and independent people. As Nouwen came to learn and document, over 15 million Ukrainians lost their lives in the twentieth century alone, due to two world wars and the genocidal activities of both the Nazi and Russian regimes. Such repression left deeply rooted scars in the hearts of the Ukrainian people. Nouwen referred to them at that time as a handicapped people. *"It is the handicap that comes from a broken history"*, Nouwen states, *"from centuries of oppression and exploitation, from neglect and indifference of the wealthy nations, from the social sins of injustice and greed."*

Nouwen encountered the Ukrainian people at a time of great physical poverty, as well as deeply emotional and spiritual woundedness, acknowledging them as people beloved by God, with their own history, culture and future, searching for freedom, recognition, and their own God-given dignity. He saw Ukraine as the poor foster child of Europe and points to Christ's call to care for the poor, not just poor individuals, but poor nations as well. Christ's command to care for the poor *"means also to care for the nations that are crushed by the forces of history and live under the burden of being ignored and rejected by the international community."* Such insight led Nouwen to a deep desire to stay faithful to the people of Ukraine.

If you are interested in seeing the Ukrainian conflict through a different lens, I highly recommend "Ukraine Diary". While written 30 years ago it provides insights into the political, social, and spiritual mindset of the people of Ukraine today. As Nouwen's close friend and fellow traveler, Archbishop Borys Gudziak, states in the book's introduction, *"Henri visited the land of Ukraine in its nativity. Now, in the minds of many, it is being born again. This advent, marked by pain and blood, is transforming the world."* Nouwen's "Ukraine Diary" is a timely and prophetic book. I hope you enjoy it as much as I have!

Rivers, Francine <u>Unashamed</u> (One of the unlikely women who changed eternity)

This is the second novella in the Lineage of Grace series, works of historical fiction based on the Bible that portray five women whom God chose to play a key role in the lineage of Jesus Christ. Each woman faced extraordinary challenges and took great personal risks to fulfill her calling. They were not perfect and yet God used them in His plan to bring forth Christ, the Savior of the world. *Unashamed* is the story of Rehab, a prostitute from Jericho who was instrumental in bringing about its destruction. She was exploited by men, but she held fast to her faith in an allpowerful God. She eventually fell in love and married; her marriage was the beginning of a bloodline that yielded King David and ultimately, Jesus. (Call No. FIC-RIV)

Confirmation Prep Registration

Registration for the Confirmation Preparation Program at St Paul's Church is now open. Confirmation preparation in the Diocese of Rochester is a two-year formation program that begins in 8th grade and is geared at helping the candidates in their faith development as well as helping them to understand the basic teachings of the Catholic Church. Any potential candidate can begin the program later than 8th grade.

The instructional content includes: an understanding of Confirmation as a Sacrament of Initiation with special connections to Baptism and First Eucharist; an understanding of the role of the Holy Spirit in the life of the individual and of the Church; a greater awareness of the person of Jesus Christ and his teachings as found in Scripture; an understanding of the importance of social justice; an understanding of the Catholic Church: its Divine origin, sacraments, doctrines, history and hierarchical structure; an understanding of the moral teachings of the Catholic Church including the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes; an understanding of the structure of the Mass and the manner for participating in it; an understanding of prayer and its importance in our lives; a working knowledge of the Catechism of the Catholic Church; an understanding of Christian vocations.

To register, you may complete the form on the website: Confirmation/St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church (stpaulsrcc.org) or you may collect the Confirmation registration form on the Bulletin Board across from the parish office. The fee is \$50 per candidate. Payments can be made in checks payable to St Paul Parish, memo: Confirmation or in cash at the parish office. 
